
## Maths

-If you can't access online resources or just want some other ideas!



• **Finding halves and quarters of shapes:** Can you draw 4 simple 2D shapes : circle, square, triangle, rectangle – use a ruler to be accurate. Now fold them in half you can cut along this line to make 2 halves. What if you fold each half in half? Cut along these lines – you have now found quarters – 4 quarters = 1 whole and 2 quarters = 1 half.

- **Fruit fractions:** If you are eating a banana or apple or orange can you cut it in half and then quarters first? Do some fruits share out into fractions fairly? Are there some fruits that you can't cut in half or quarter – draw me a picture.



**Lego fractions:** How can you show me half and quarter of different numbers with your lego? Can you take some photos of what you find out? Are there some numbers that you can't cut in half?



- Playdough is a great way to explore halves and quarters. What other fractions can you make? 3 equal pieces = thirds etc.

- **Practise number bonds to 20 – addition and subtraction:** Use things from home for counting (pasta, coins, lego, bricks etc) and practise adding and subtracting to 20. How fast can you go? Write 10 number sentences, then try them again and see if you can remember the answers.
- **Practise your 2x, 5x, 10x and 3x tables.**


